## Broken Chain



Rudolph Henry Toews was born on the family homestead in the Guernsey area on September 19, 1928 to Henry (Heinz) and Tina Toews, the second of four children. He grew up on the farm with his three siblings, Irene, Katie and Walter.

Their home was close to the Philadelphia Mennonite Brethren Church where the family was actively involved. This is where he began his lifelong personal faith in Jesus, was baptized, taught Sunday School, sang in the choir and made many lifelong friends. After completing school, he continued his education at Bethany Bible College in Hepburn, SK, for three years.

Upon his return to the Watrous area, he married Florence Klassen, who he had grown up with. They were married on Oct. 10, 1953, and they were blessed with five children, Howard, Carolyn, Darlene, Debra and Dale.

Dad and Mom carved out a livelihood for our family on the farm. Howard came back to the farm in 1974 and joined them in the mixed farming operation. Later, once married to Lucy in 1977, they moved onto the main yard with Dad and Mom where the four of them farmed together for many years until Dad and Mom made the move into Watrous. The operation continues today with Brad and Angel and their children now living on the home place.

Even once retired, Dad loved to come out to the ranch. He made many trips out to see what was going on, bringing out the mail, and, as recently as summer of 2018, still servicing the lawnmower and mowing grass and helping where he could.

Dad was active in the community. He volunteered with the Gideons and at Dallas Valley Camp with Mom well into their eighties. He loved sports, especially watching grandchildren and great grandchildren play hockey and football. Dad curled, playing until a few years ago.

Dad enjoyed singing, listening to classical, gospel and country music. Mom and Dad had a busy social life, going to the symphony, live theatre and supporting the arts around the community. He loved to travel and to meet people and making connections, finding out where they were from and whom they were related to. Going for coffee with friends was a highlight in town, at Danceland, or any Tim Hortons.
